### Feedback Obtained

Feedback from the students are collected from the University Department Section and it is analyzed by the Department of Statistics. The feedback contains 10 criterions on the following titles: 1. The teacher comes to the class punctually 2. The coverage of the syllabus 3. The teacher teaches the concepts interestingly with elaborate examples 4. The teacher encourages discussion during teaching 5. The teacher maintains discipline in the class effectively 6. The teacher facilitates the overall personality development of students 7. The teacher -student relationship 8. The teacher's evaluation of assignments and test paper 9. The teacher gives feedback on the performance is tests/seminars/assignments 10. The teacher gives individual Guidance / Counseling. Five point scaling is used for evaluation. The analyzed feedback is submitted to the Head of the Institution and a copy is handed over to the concerned faculty members for the corrective actions. Though it is not reflected in their career advancement system the teachers take it seriously and correct themselves. A registered alumni association conducts a meeting annually and collect the feedback from the alumni. The suggestions are reported at the HOD meet and taken for corrective action. Similarly the feedback proforma is sent to the employers and the reply is analyzed by the Head of the departments and discussed in the staff meeting. The feedback from the employers are considered in the syllabus revision. The feedback on the parents are considered while improving the infrastructures.
