Unit: III Fashion Evolution and Fashion Forecasting

Fashion evolution – Fashion cycles, Length of cycles, consumer groups in fashion cycles – fashion leaders, fashion innovators, fashion motivation, fashion victim, Fashion followers. Adoption of Fashion theories – Trickle down, trickle up and trickle across. Fashion forecasting – Need for forecasting.

Unit: IV Designing Dresses for Unusual Figures

Designing dresses for unusual figures—becoming and unbecoming— for the following figure types. Stout figure, thin figure, narrow shoulders, broad shoulders, round shoulders, largebust, flat chest, large hip, large abdomen, round face, large face, small face, prominent chin and jaw, prominent forehead.

Unit: V Fashion Terminologies and Fashion Profiles
